Safety

A high priority of OHI has always been to help make our neighborhood safe. To this end we have committed to having at least one set of security cameras installed in our neighborhood. The camera has a wide field of vision and the records of activity can be viewed by law enforcement in the event of an incident. These cameras are made available to us through a special program of the City and facilitated by the office of Councilwoman Darlene Harris. If we become successful in this endeavor, a second set of cameras may become available to us. In addition to this, we continue to help organize and coordinate effective block watches. We have designated a Board member to lead this effort by enlisting Block Watch Captains and providing updates to the community.

Neighborhood Communications

It is essential for any community organization to effectively communicate with its residents, and admittedly we can do a better job. We have designated a member of our Board to establish a new website that we can maintain ourselves to keep information fresh and relevant, to provide transparency by publishing our meeting minutes, the OHI Journal, and other Board business, and to encourage communication back from the community. We also maintain and are committed to grow an email contact list for anyone in the neighborhood who would like to receive a monthly Calendar of Events. Local Author Publishes Haunting True Crime Story

Observatory Hill's own Jim Hollock sat at the table of Rich Sestric's home one December afternoon enjoying a cup of tea and talking about his experiences as a writer. Jim's book Born to Lose: Stanley B. Hoss and the Crime Spree that Gripped the Nation has already been likened to American crime classics such as Helter Skelter and The Executioner's Song.



Indeed, FBI Supervisory Special Agent, Ret. Larry Likar states, "James Hollock's book is the best creative non-fiction novel since Truman Capote's In Cold Blood. Once I opened the book and read the Prologue, I could not put the book down. It is that good." Pittsburgh's Dr. Cyril H. Wecht says, "Born to Lose is a fascinating read, an extraordinary book. The amount of work that went into compiling this account of a criminal madman is staggering, yet it reads like a fictional suspense thriller. Well done!"

Jim spent over ten years writing the story, including five years of research. He understands that being raised in the story's locale, of the same generation as multiple murderer Stanley Hoss and his victims, and with a 30 year career at Western Penitentiary, he has a unique vantage point.

OHIJ: What motivated you to write the story told in *Born to Lose*? JH: I've always wanted to be an author and you've heard "Write what you know." I constantly heard his name, 'Hoss' when I worked at the Western Penitentiary. After all, it was the most infamous crime of this region - maybe ever. Well, I know criminals, at least. I know the system. And here it is, one of the most outrageous crime stories of all times in Pennsylvania, and no one's written this?

OHIJ: Was it difficult to gather the background and forensic details? JH: Collecting the data was very detailed and time consuming. At the same time, it provided opportunities for me to speak with fascinating people who were true to life characters in my book. I was determined to 'leave no stone unturned' during research. Hoss's victims of assault and rape, police and prison personnel, victims' families, prosecution and defense attorneys, judges, the wife, the mistress – have all talked for the first time on record. In a large sense, I put down the words but they have written the story.

OHIJ: What was it like to interview such a wide variety of people? **JH:** Interviewing sixty individuals who contributed their own perspectives to the story was a fascinating journey back in time. On more than one occasion, I was walking on egg shells, just hoping to get to speak to some of those most close to Hoss. I recall the time I went to see his former mistress. I could not call ahead for fear she would not speak to me. It took a few minutes after I pressed the doorbell for an answer. And it was tough to talk through a closed door, but I knew she would know things about Hoss that nobody else could. After she opened the door, I was relieved when she said, "I always knew one day someone like you would show up here. Come in."

Venture Street Update, Community Gardeners Welcome

Jan Moreland, who has lived on Venture Street for 30 years, enjoys the park and greenery of the neighborhood here and likes to garden. Last spring she thought of a plan to make Venture Street look great for the neighbors who lived near her and those who travel Venture Street each day. During the summer and early fall, she put her plan into action and was able to replace the unsightly weeds with heavy plastic and a neat mulch surface.

But Jan did not complete the project alone. Over three sessions during the summer and early fall, Jan and her neighborhood friends pulled on garden gloves and pulled weeds from the planting strip below the high wall on Venture. Jan says "I thought it would take a long time, but it was light work, and made more fun with the help of neighbors who worked whenever they could.
