### GTECH RECLAIM NORTHSIDE AMBASSADORS submitted by Lydia Yoder

Last October, 14 Northside residents gathered bimonthly for classes focused on giving them the resources and skills to reclaim vacant lots in their neighborhoods. The program they are part of is called ReClaim Northside and is a project of GTECH Strategies.

In April, these residents, called ReClaim Northside Ambassadors, held a presentation at the Pittsburgh Project to share their ideas with the community. These nine Northside residents will transform vacant lots near their homes into green community spaces throughout this summer with the support of volunteers and GTECH staff. The spaces they plan to create range from small parks to trails to native flower gardens.

Ambassadors and Observatory Hill residents Doug Deckert, Cynthia Levy-Mendoza and their Mentor, Dorrie Smith of OHI and past ReClaim Ambassador, have begun to work on two vacant lots in the neighborhood.

Doug Deckert plans to transform a lot on Baytree Street, which is currently full of invasive plants and rubble, into a lively community space complete with raised garden beds, lawn games and a campfire pit. He imagines a space where neighbors can come together for food and fun. He plans to call the site "Baytree Street Community Garden".

Cynthia is working on a vacant lot at the intersection of Perryview St. and Perrysville Ave, which has sat vacant for many years. In its current state it an eyesore for those waiting at the bus stop and passersby getting their first glimpse of Pittsburgh as they drive through. Cynthia calls the space "A Place for Moms: Welcome Corner". She runs an organization, Brown Mamas, which assists African-American mothers in enjoying their motherhood journey by providing information, tools and social support. Cynthia will be working alongside Brown Mamas to create a welcoming corner lot with benches for those waiting for the bus, a Little Free Library and beautiful flower gardens.

# Strengthening Neighborhoods through Community Action

This spring I co-sponsored legislation that creates an incentive program for local small businesses to raise their pay above the minimum wage. For businesses that raise their wages to the federally recommended \$10.10/hour,

the city will offer free advertising on bus shelters. The program is designed to bring more middle class, family sustaining jobs to Pittsburgh.

Did you know that the Urban Redevelopment Authority offers 0% interest loans to city residents for home improvements? The program is only offered to household that meet the income requirements. ### **DEAR NEIGHBORS**

The Board of Directors of Observatory Hill Inc. (OHI) takes great pleasure in serving our neighborhood. It has been a busy and a productive year so far, and I would like to share with you some of our accomplishments, current projects, and upcoming events:

OHI was able to purchase three vacant buildings in our commercial district and are working on securing appropriate businesses to fill them. (Spoiler alert – look for a new restaurant in the neighborhood!) They will be fully rehabbed, and we will offer residential space on the second floor of the buildings. We have also purchased several vacant homes on a nearby street and are rehabbing those to improve the quality of the neighborhood. Our architect is busy drafting upgrades to make these homes and businesses much more attractive. It is our hope to continue this process on other streets.

We hosted the Mayor's Night Out where Mayor Bill Peduto brought his staff to meet the community to answer our questions and to address issues. We made much needed connections and are working to partner with these leaders for future improvements. Among these improvements are the long awaited opening of our new soccer field and the anticipated improvements to the Riverview Park Playground.

OHI is working with GTech Strategies to plant a community garden on a vacant lot on Baytree Street.

Street Trees were acquired through Tree Pittsburgh and Tree Vitalize and were planted in the business district.

We hosted a special meeting with City Officials and the Pittsburgh Police to address security issues in our neighborhood.

OHI regularly represents our community to City government and other Authorities on matters of safety, economic development, education, zoning issues, and public services.

On June 7, we will host our annual Observatory Hill House Tour from 1–5pm. Join us to tour various historic homes and businesses in the neighborhood. See our website to purchase tickets online or buy them the day of the tour. www.observatoryhill.net

# **VOLUNTEERS PLANT TREES TO BEAUTIFY OUR NEIGHBORHOOD**

Observatory Hill is one of most tree covered neighborhoods on the northside, largely because we have Riverview Park at our doorstep. Still, there are areas that lack trees and one of most obvious is our business district. We applied for trees through TreeVitalize – a statewide program which is a joint project of Allegheny County, the City of Pittsburgh, PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, Tree Pittsburgh and the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy.

Certain conditions must exist for trees to thrive. First, the curb and sidewalk must be separate – if poured as one piece, the cuts needed to establish tree pits can crumble the curb. Second, the area for planting must be free of utilities like water and gas. Third, and of equal importance, is the property owner must give permission to plant the tree(s).

On May 2, a group of volunteers, under the supervision of the TreeVitalize staff, planted 10 trees in the business district. After a demonstration of the proper planting techniques, the volunteers were set loose to plant the remainder of the trees. Fortunately, the pits had been dug by the city and filled with topsoil making the digging easier.

The trees look great and have weathered their first few weeks. After taking training from TreeVitalize, our neighborhood's four Tree Tenders will be responsible for watering for them. Thanks to all who participated, to Schorr's Bakery and to Mandy's Pizza for their generous food donations and to those who donated their time and supplies.

### 5K Run and Fitness Walk & Heritage Day Festival


