

ANGELS' PLACE PROVIDING CHILD CARE TO THOSE WITH LITTLE TO NO SUPPORT

An overwhelming number of babies are born each year in Allegheny County to single mothers, 19 years of age and under. In fact, according to the Allegheny County Health Department, that number topped 600 babies in 2012. Parents who choose to keep their babies often encounter numerous challenges and important, life-changing decisions, especially when trying to raise children on their own. Without support, these parents can quickly become entangled in a web of poverty driven by low-paying jobs or financial dependency.

But support does exist.

Angels' Place, Inc. has provided support, concern, and compassion to young parents since 1984. With three facilities, including a center in the North Side that opened in 1998, Angels' Place is led by a skilled team of 25 employees and more than 250 volunteers. Each center, accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children, provides an array of services, including child care, tutoring, support groups, counseling, and required classes in parenting, nutrition, child safety, and life skills.

Erin Harvey, family support specialist, has worked at Angels' Place for one year. When asked what sparked her interest in the organization, she noted, "I fell in love with their mission and wanted to align myself with the great work that I saw happening to empower families."

Angels' Place's support network allows parents to focus on completing their education and achieving personal goals. "When



obstacles arise, Angels' Place is there to provide supportive assistance and encouragement," said Harvey.

To be eligible, a parent must be low-income, single, and a full-time student with a child under age 5. Given the commitment of Angels' Place to the parent and child, the organization requires that parents maintain attendance in school and achieve specific grade requirements to remain in the program.

The organization is currently planning for its annual Halo Awards Dinner at The Le Mont on Grandview Avenue in Mt. Washington. The event will happen on Thursday, October 29 and will celebrate 31 years of success. The evening will also honor Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Massaro Jr. for their contributions and support to the organization and community.

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FROM THE DESK OF DARLENE HARRIS



This summer, I secured passage of the Film Permitting Ordinance, which provides clear guidelines for filming movies, TV, and commercial productions in the city.

Although over 200 productions have taken place here in recent years, bringing billions of dollars in economic activity and providing jobs for city residents, the city has never had a clear permitting process. Filming often involves closing streets, rerouting buses, and providing police to direct traffic. This ordinance will encourage filming in Pittsburgh and ensure that it does not disrupt life for our residents.

In response to the many complaints I received from communities in District 1, I put together a task force to update our noise ordinance. Currently the ordinance is difficult to enforce and requires expensive decibel readers. After years of hard work, City Council recently approved a new ordinance. The new version gives police officers more flexibility to issue citations for excessive noise, to improve the quality of life in our communities.

Paving work in Riverview Park is underway, bringing much-needed improvements to this regional asset. In addition to repaving Riverview Drive, the city will be installing a unique new water fountain at the dog park, designed to be used by people and dogs alike.

In response to the recent increase in crime throughout the city, I have challenged the administration to increase our staffing levels for the police and fire bureaus. Although the city has budgeted for 892 police officers, we only have 814 officers on the street because of a recent wave of retirements and officers leaving for jobs in other municipalities. I recently hosted a televised Post Agenda meeting in City Council to discuss possible solutions and bring awareness to this problem. We need greater protection for our residents and faster response times when incidents occur.

NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS

- OHI began meeting with the Urban Redevelopment Authority in January 2014 to develop a plan for the abandoned church located on Bonvue Street. The building has been vacant for some time and the blighted property was becoming a concern to residents. Several factors were considered in the decision-making process: the extensive cost to repair the building, the fact that two prior businesses failed at this location, and the lack of available parking should a new business move in. In the end, it was decided to demolish the building. We are hopeful that it will be the site of future new construction.
- Plans to revitalize our business district are continuing. Our architect is working with our Business District Committee to draft designs for the three buildings that we purchased. - OHI has applied for grant money from the city, made available from Councilwoman Darlene Harris, for the purchase of a second set of cameras for our business district. They will be placed on 3917 Perrysville Ave. (formerly known as Mr. Bill's Tap & Grill). We already have one set of cameras placed on Dr. Uhler's office.
- We are working to purchase blighted properties and have acquired several this year. Once a contractor is selected, the rehab process will begin. These 1920s-era homes will be updated with first-floor powder rooms and will be a great buy – and don't forget the short commute into the city!

Board Elections Held This Fall

We are collecting applications for those interested in being on the board of OHI. This is a two-year term which involves: attending the monthly board meetings held the 3rd Wednesday of the month (no meeting is held in December); helping with the annual house tour and/or the annual Heritage Festival, and participating in one of the various committees which make up the board. A Word From The Mayor's Office

The summer has gotten off to an exciting start for the city of Pittsburgh! We would like to share with you some news out of the Mayor's Office from the first few weeks of the season.

The Pittsburgh manufacturing industry received a boost on July 8 when U.S. Secretary of Commerce Penny Pritzker announced that Pittsburgh was one of 12 cities named this year to the Investing in Manufacturing Communities Partnership. Cities in the Partnership receive unique federal support for long-term economic development growth in regional manufacturing.

In an effort to ensure that Pittsburgh's taxpayers receive their fair share of the funds generated by Rivers Casino, the city filed legal action on July 2 to force the Intergovernmental Cooperation Authority to release \$11.4 million that is owed. The city is due a total of \$20 million by the end of this year, but not one penny has been delivered despite ICA approval of city budgets.



At the end of June, Mayor Peduto released the comprehensive Welcoming Pittsburgh Plan, which will serve as a road map to build a more welcoming experience for Pittsburgh's immigrant community and a more livable city for all residents. On June 19, Pittsburgh welcomed Vice Premier of the People's Republic of China Liu Yandong for a broad-ranging discussion with Mayor Peduto. Vice Premier Liu is the highest ranking government official to visit the City-County Building since former Vice President Walter Mondale.

A very exciting program started this summer called GrubUp, which is a Citiparks program that provided free breakfasts and lunches to children throughout the city during the summer months. Business Spotlight on Mosquito Joe

When Joanna Patterson wanted to take on a new venture, she looked to provide a service and to make a difference. Opening a Mosquito Joe franchise provided her with that opportunity earlier this year. It came in handy when a family friend was bitten by a tick and then contracted Lyme disease. "Some people are targeted more than others because of their body chemistry," said Joanna. Allegheny County Health Department records show that Lyme disease is on the rise and it is a concern. In addition, the county has sprayed several residential areas to reduce the mosquito population in an effort to lower the risk of West Nile Virus, which is also on the rise.

Born and raised in Pittsburgh, Joanna received her MBA from the University of Pittsburgh. She dropped out of the workforce when she had children but, as they got older, she was ready to take on new challenges. After research, she discovered Mosquito Joe. She likes the company's model and the opportunity it gives her to provide a service to others. Certified by the state as a commercial applicator of pest control products, Joanna learned what attracts both ticks and mosquitoes. She says to reduce mosquitoes, be sure to empty any water-holding vessels. Have a barrier around the yard if possible – many flying insects will look for foliage as a place to land.

So that you can fully enjoy your yard in our limited summer season, Mosquito Joe offers several services to reduce these pests – from treating clogged gutters where larvae can grow to spraying the barrier around your home. Treatments last for 21 days, after which the weather and heat will break it down. A technician will then return for another application. All-natural treatments are also available.
