

Riverview Park Community Center Update

The City's project involves construction of an artificial turf soccer field, a proposed community center building, and parking in Riverview Park at the former dump site along Mairdale Street. Headed by Mayor Luke Ravenstahl, Councilwoman Darlene Harris, Representative Don Walko, the Department of Parks and Recreation, and the Department of City Planning, the City has set a high priority on utilizing community input. Representatives of the four adjacent communities have been designated and are working with the City to help guide the design of the facility. Soccer field construction will be the first phase.

The second meeting between the community Working Group and the City took place on Thursday, October 8, 2009 at the Riverview Park Visitor's Center. Project progress was discussed and next steps determined. In addition to the representatives of the four neighborhood groups, in attendance were Duane Ashley (Parks and Recreation), Christie Berger (Mayor's Office), Andrew Dash (Dept. of City Planning), Kim Graziani (Mayor's Office), and Jim Sauer (JT Sauer & Associates).

Jim Sauer presented the athletic field design draft. The current design reflects a soccer only field with a walking track, but it was decided that Jim would report back to the group with an updated design showing a larger field (size of football field), with a walking track surrounding it. He will determine the impact into the existing site and work and update the cost estimate. Much of the group was supportive of making it the size of a football field, but only making it as a soccer field. The group reviewed differences between turf samples, and asked that the parking lot utilize natural storm water management. The City is planning on making improvements to the sidewalk along Mairdale to allow residents to walk to the field, tying into the existing trails, to allow access to the field. Lighting funds have been secured for along Mairdale Street, but athletic field lighting is still to be determined due to the potential impact upon the existing residences. This issue is still open and will be discussed at an upcoming community meeting this November. The next steps involve the Working Group reviewing the updated design, and then the community meeting took place in early December to present the current design and get feedback. The project is still on track for start of construction in spring 2010.

District 1 News from Councilwoman Darlene M. Harris

Absolutely a top concern is violence. There is never a place for gun violence, really never a place for any violence, and the loss of our children – as victims and as perpetrators – is unconscionable. I remain behind any and all efforts to curb violence. We do not have any children to spare. We cannot keep losing people to senseless violence.

Meanwhile, the news of Allegheny Commons Park, specifically East Park, is noteworthy. Duquesne Light Company has a vault under the ground, with manhole covers over it, near the entryway on Cedar Avenue. The company brought a plan to the neighborhood which has developed over the last few months into a project that would locate a metal monolith – 28 feet by 9 feet by 9 feet – directly in that gateway entrance to the park.

We have gathered representatives from various departments in City government, and are now working through our law department alongside the communities of the North Side, to arrive at a satisfactory resolution to this matter. I have posted documentation to my City webpage.

In happier news, we are continuing work on the popular dog run near the tennis courts, beyond the Observatory. The fencing now better holds smaller pets, and we are looking forward to such improvements as a water fountain.



Also in Riverview Park, we are working with the Mayor and Citiparks on a plan for a Soccer Field and Recreation Center. This project will be bringing additional soccer space and a multipurpose recreation center to the community on the edge of Riverview Park, below the Perry Academy Gym Annex on Maridale. We will have a series of meetings and continue planning with residents and neighborhood representatives, toward construction this spring.

We received quite a bit of press recently for my latest initiative: recycling asphalt. A few national publications have mentioned our interest in the process. There is more information about it on my website. The sooner we buy it, the sooner we begin saving money. There is no room for detail here, but this is a win-win prospect. The City saves millions of

taxpayer dollars, we reduce our carbon footprint by around 80%, the work is done by City workers rather than contractors (so the money and jobs remain in the city), and we reuse what we already have. We would save money, help the environment, and repave more roads right away.
