

Observatory Hill House Tour


Hundreds of eager people from Pittsburgh and beyond visited fourteen homes in Observatory Hill on Sunday, May 22 between 1 and 5 p.m. Spanning more than a century in dates of construction, the houses represented a wide array of styles, looks, and construction.

Homeowners, a developer, and Observatory Hill Inc. opened these homes on a mostly sunny, cool day for the 2005 Observatory Hill House Tour. Several generous sponsors funded the return of the tour, which was not held in 2004.

Tour participants began with the sign-up tables in front of Riverview Presbyterian Church at Perrysville Avenue and Riverview Park Drive. Trolleys whisked them away to the homes, which were located from Marshall Avenue in the south all the way to the northern reaches of the city on Waldorf Street.

Visitors toured homes on Perrysville Avenue, Waldorf Street, Marshall Road, Watson Boulevard, and Richey Avenue. Some have been owned by the same people for many years. Others belonged to newer homeowners. A few were for sale or rent. Each lent a distinct flair to the tour.

Styles ranged from classic Victorian mansions to a Craftsman-style bungalow. Some were built in the 1800s, while a few were built just within the past year. Together, all of the homes featured on the tour highlighted the wonderful variety of houses and yards available in Observatory Hill.

Reverse Mortgage: Is It Right For You?

A reverse mortgage is a special type of home loan that lets homeowners over the age of 62 convert a portion of the equity in their home into cash. But unlike a traditional mortgage or home equity loan, no repayment is required until the borrower no longer uses the home as a primary residence.

Tax-free cash payments can be received in a variety of ways, including a lump sum, a line of credit to be accessed when money is needed, or monthly payments. The cash

can provide seniors with financial security without having to sell their home. In addition, the payments do not affect Social Security or Medicare benefits.

There are no income or medical eligibility requirements. The amount of money you can get from a reverse mortgage generally depends on the applicant's age, the type of reverse mortgage sought, the appraised value of the home, current interest rates, and in some cases, the area in which you live. Most property types are eligible for a reverse mortgage.

Taking out any type of loan carries risks and financial implications. Free information is available from AARP by calling 1-800-209-8085 or visit www.aarp.org. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development also has free information on its web site at www.hud.gov/groups/seniors.cfm. I encourage anyone considering a reverse mortgage to contact these organizations, discuss your options and concerns with your family, and consult a lawyer with questions about estate planning.



Observatory Hill continues to enjoy a reputation as one of the safest neighborhoods in Pittsburgh, according to police reports and statistics. Pittsburgh consistently ranks among the safest large U.S. cities. Combined, this makes our neighborhood one of urban America's safest.

As everywhere, there are challenges, and

Observatory Hill Inc. encourages ongoing efforts to make our area safer still. OHI thanks the Pittsburgh Bureau of Police and Magisterial District Judge Robert Ravenstahl, who have addressed OHI volunteers in recent months to update us on crime reports and to make suggestions on increasing safety.

OHI helped to organize several blockwatches that unite neighbors in keeping a watchful eye and serving as a visible warning to potential criminals. Join the blockwatch on your street or contact OHI for information on starting one if none yet operates near you.

Here are some other helpful tips that make sense. Not only will they serve as a deterrent to crime, they will also provide you with greater peace of mind.

- Always lock your doors when away from home or asleep.
- Never leave the car running while unattended.
- Never leave the windows open in an unattended house or car.
- Consider installing locks on home windows.
- Leave nothing valuable in sight in a parked car.
- Keep your home well-lit.
- Arrange to have mail and newspaper delivery stopped or picked up by neighbors when away on a trip.
- Call 911 whenever you witness crime or suspicious activity. Avoid confronting the perpetrator(s).
- After calling 911, file "silent complaint" forms with police when you have a chronic problem to report (repeated disturbing of the peace, drug dealing, etc.). This provides police with a record with which to better track and prevent wrongdoing. Saluting a Neighborhood Hero... Memories of Maryjane Berry: Community Leader, Caring Friend

Maryjane Berry, longtime neighbor and former officer of Observatory Hill, Inc. passed away on February 5th after a long illness. She is missed by her three daughters and their families including 11 grandchildren—two brothers and many friends.

For more than 50 years, Maryjane, husband Jack, and their three daughters lived on Richey Avenue. She lived as an outspoken advocate for her community, a "take charge" neighbor who put her time and talents to good use for the well-being of the street where she raised her daughters and the neighborhood beyond—from the business district to the park to the greater North Side.

Her friends recall laughter and good times with Maryjane, no matter what the event. She was a lifelong member of the Daughters of Erin, Court #9, a longtime 26th Ward Democratic Party Committee Woman, a 26th Ward Democratic Action Committee member, and active in community organizations in Observatory Hill. In the early 1980s, Maryjane and other neighbors founded the blockwatch group for Richey Avenue and Dunlap Place, which developed into Preservation North Inc., later known as Observatory Hill, Inc.

Through her example, Maryjane motivated others to take active community roles. She was a board member and officer with Observatory Hill, Inc. for more than fifteen years. In recognition of her considerable contributions to the neighborhood, Maryjane was named North Sider of the Year for Observatory Hill in spring 1988. She and her family worked hard to coordinate and staff the 1994 Riverview Park Centennial Celebration.

The neighbors who grew up near Maryjane's home recall the front porch chats, walks with her to the park, block parties, and holiday events. Close neighbors thought of her as their "Second Mom" and a fun-loving friend.

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Fight Nuisance Activity & Crime

Nuisance activity and crime continue to be challenges that face all of our North Side neighborhoods. My office regularly receives calls regarding unwelcome activity. My staff and I constantly interact with the police regarding these very serious issues. Although progress may seem slow at times, I assure you that I do not take these matters lightly, and neither do the police.

Chief Robert McNeilly and I are working diligently to increase the number of officers on the street to the budgeted number of 900. I am confident that we will be fully staffed in the near future, thus giving our officers more resources to address the needs of our communities.

The police need the help of residents to ensure we are productive in our attempts to minimize these nuisance activities. Many constituents have called my office and the police with information

such as license plate numbers and times of day of the suspicious activities, and I urge others to do so as well. The Zone 1 Police can be reached at 412-323-7201. Studying Japan, pupils made 1,000 origami cranes as a peace wish or prayer. Younger students wrote to soldiers in Iraq.




