It has exposed beams, a stained-glass window, a window seat and several leaded glass windows.

We have met with TreeVitalize and have secured more trees for a second planting in the business district and on Bonvue Street.

We have applied for another Neighborhood Needs Grant, which will allow us to install several more sets of security cameras once the paperwork has been processed.

We had our biggest and best house tour ever. We thank the many homeowners, business sponsors, volunteers and house

tour committee members who made this amazing day possible. We sold record tickets, had outstanding support from our business sponsors and broke Facebooks likes and shares and views. Thanks everyone for helping to support your neighborhood!

A WORD FROM THE MAYOR

Summer is drawing to a close and what a summer it has been for Pittsburgh! As we look forward to the fall, here is some news the news that the Office of Mayor William Peduto would like to share with our friends in Observatory Hill.

In July, Mayor Peduto signed an Executive Order on Responsible Contracting. The Executive Order was designed to support the local construction industry and promote new job training opportunities in Pittsburgh. The order creates a labor-management task force that will study ways to: assist new businesses that want to invest in the city, support redevelopment in under-served neighborhoods, connect reputable contractors with local construction opportunities, and connect local residents with training necessary to find good-paying jobs in the construction industry.



One of the top priorities of Mayor Peduto's administration has been increasing the public accessibility of City of Pittsburgh information and data. The City of Pittsburgh recently implemented a series of technological upgrades to ease the process of obtaining government permits. Permits from the city's Special Events office can now be obtained online and paid for with credit cards. The City now also accepts credit cards as payment for all permits issued by the Departments of Public Works (DPW) and Permits Licenses and Inspections (PLI). In addition, the City of Pittsburgh has launched an online and user-friendly database of City properties that are available for sale. For years there were no lists of City-owned buildings and vacant properties available for purchase. The new website now allows interested buyers to view all available properties on an online map or search for them by street name or parcel number.


These new technological resources can be found via the revamped official City of Pittsburgh website, pittsburghpa.gov ! The upgraded website brings a new design and increased functionality, including advanced search options and mobile compatibility. This is the first significant update to the website in almost six years and is focused on user experience and accessibility. To that end, the website will be going through a period of continued updates, so please click the "Feedback" button in the bottom left corner of the main page to help give us input on improvement!



Regina Scott Is Our Neighbor of the Year By Dorrie Smith

Regina Scott has been a resident of Observatory Hill for over 38 years. Although retired from the Board of Education she hasn't let retirement slow her down. She now enjoys travelling and spending time with her family. In 2016, Regina participated in City of Pittsburgh Senior Games, taking home two silver medals and a bronze just to name a few. Regina is also a very active volunteer for her Observatory Hill community, always asking what she can do to assist. Here are a few reasons of why she has been chosen as Observatory Hill's Neighbor of the Year: Regina has cooked 6 out of 10 of the Observatory Hill Inc's annual Spaghetti Dinners, last year with a broken ankle which was in a boot. She is the first person many community and city residents will stop to have enjoyable conversations with at the information table for OHI's Heritage Day Festival. In addition, she has been a docent for the Observatory Hill House Tour and in earlier years has participated in neighborhood clean-ups.

Always with a smile and a "Hello" for all, she is fondly known by the OHI board and by many others as Aunt Regina. We are proud to call Regina Scott our Neighbor of the Year.



Getting Down to Business

Observatory Hill is fortunate to have some wonderful buildings in our commercial district and we have been working on the goals of improving safety, beautifying our streetscape and attracting new businesses. To support the continued revitalization of our neighborhood, we will redevelop two commercial buildings: 3917 and 3923-3925 Perrysville Avenue and are working to acquire other key buildings in dire need of improvements. Here is a snapshot of our steady progress:

- Enlisted the help of the Northside Leadership Conference to guide us, to get the word out on the types of businesses we would like to attract, to assist us in securing loans and grants and to manage our real estate projects.
- 2) 3917 and 3923-25 Perrysville Ave
 - a. Acquired these three properties with a goal to bring neighborhood serving businesses.
 - b. Hired VAF Architecture to draft designs to show us our potential.
 - c. Hired a realtor who is marketing these properties for lease.
 - d. Took out a \$20,000 loan to correct issues with the underground utilities in our sidewalks.
- e. Secured \$98,500 in grant funds from the Urban Redevelopment Authority earmarked for façade and other exterior improvements to our 3917-3923-3925 Perrysville Avenue buildings. We are working to secure matching loans from the Northside Community Development Fund. Work is expected to begin this Fall on the façades.

- Received a \$10,000 grant from The Sprout Fund which went toward façade and streetscape improvements for existing businesses so they too could take part in our wave of revitalization.
- 4) Put a nearby vacant and tax delinquent house in a sale to allow for future expansion.
- 5) Installed security cameras in 2015 and have a grant in the works to install several more.
- Worked with TreeVitalize to add trees to our sidewalks and neighboring businesses.
- 7) Thanks to capital budget funding from the City, we worked with the office of Darlene Harris to install new acorn lights and several new sidewalks with the money that was available.
